Taking Control of Covid 19 in Nyaishozi

Action in Africa has helped schools reopen safely in Nyaishozi, by providing funds for the purchase of disinfectant, masks, gloves and hand sanitisers, as seen below, as a Ruhinda student prepares his classroom for lessons.



Children were provided with personal hand sanitisers and wash stations have been set up outside classrooms, ensuring that students have access to hand washing facilities throughout the school day. Also, very simple solutions, such as 'tippy taps' have been constructed from readily available materials and work just as well. Teaching the children the importance of good personal hygiene, as

seen below by Nyaishozi's deputy head teacher, has been imperative to keep Covid 19 at bay, in a community where social distancing and self-isolation is impossible.



Educating and keeping our students safe has not been been our only focus.



The photograph above shows just one of the Covid 19 initiatives which targeted the females in the community. By instructing the local womenfolk how important it is to use gloves, masks and hand sanitisers, the local ladies can do their bit to keep the virus under control. Maternity Equipment a hit with the Mums

Kibogoizi was the first dispensary to benefit from our motorbike for nurses scheme and it is hoped that we will able to continue supporting this well deserving clinic in the future.

We had initially sent funds for the medical equipment before lockdown came into being – for these clinical technicians and patients, the long wait is finally over!

New Mill Machine for Rugu Secondary School

Maize gruel makes up the main meal of the day for most school children and where schools have to cater for boarding students, such as Rugu Secondary School, milling the grain can be costly.

We have recently contributed to a diesel milling machine. The impressive looking piece of kit pictured below will grind the maize for the students' nutritious daily snack. It will also bring in some revenue, as locals will pay to have their home grown grain milled there too.

Rugu Secondary School is a boarding school by default – many students live too far away to walk every day. Classrooms have become makeshift dormitories and land has been turned over to make room for an allotment, with students being encouraged to grow their own food supplies – including maize. They will now be able to mill the grain themselves.
