#### Bibiana's Success Story

Our Bibiana is accepted to study Law at St. Augustine University of Tanzania – we are so proud of her!



When we first met Bibiana Patrice in 2015, nobody had any idea what the future might hold for this 15 year old girl, who was living in desperate circumstances with her father, disabled mum and brother, who suffers with his mental health. She and her family, are pictured above, outside where they were living. Bibiana had only received the most basic education, intermittently, as the family finances allowed. At that time, she had no English and we had no Swahili, so we hoped that Action in Africa was making the right decision, in removing her from her daily life with her family and enrolling her to study at Nyaishozi Secondary School, where she

would become a border. It was there she would live for the next six years.



Nyaishozi Secondary School, pictured below, is private and therefore expensive. As a charity, we would only place students there who were vulnerable and whose living conditions were untenable.



Bibiana faced huge challenges – she was basically starting from scratch with her education, but she is a clever girl and worked extremely hard. However, she failed to secure enough grades to continue to 'A' level and when we returned to Nyaishozi in 2019, she was at home. When we spoke to the exams officer at the school, he felt that she had the ability to resit her exams and achieve good enough 'A' level grades to attend university. When we met with her, she told us in English how her dream was to become a lawyer. Well – she made that happen! Well done Bibiana!

Now that we were sponsoring Bibiana's education, it was hard to ignore the living conditions of the rest of her family. They lived in appalling poverty, isolated from their neighbours, in a very hostile terrain. With Bibiana away at school, it was left to her father to be the sole provider of food and water, as her mother and brother are unwell and cannot fetch the water or work the land. Action in Africa funded the construction of a modest African home, complete with guttering and a tank to harvest rainwater. (Pictured above).
