IRENE LEONIDAS AT SEWING SCHOOL

The Launch of Nyaishozi Single Young Mums Support

Nyaishozi School girls who find themselves pregnant are facing unimaginable challenges. It is not illegal for them to return to school, but the stigma of being a young, single mum is too shameful for them to face returning to full-time education.



Without an education, the future for these young women looks very bleak. To help them and their young families, we have set up a comprehensive support initiative which will fund two young mums through a sewing academy, whilst also providing health care checks, baby welfare education and a small financial support to provide for food. The first two participants are Irene Leonidas, a former Action in Africa sponsored student and Alice Easton, pictured above at the sewing school. When these young ladies have completed their tailoring and needlework course, we will continue to

support them for six months, also funding the purchase of sewing machines, materials and rent on a small village shop. Financial aid will stop when their business is up and running and they can provide for themselves and their families.



In addition, we are supporting single mothers whose children are a little older. We have partnered with the charity World Villages for Children, a U.K. charity which funds Kiluvya Training College, just outside Dar es Salaam. Kiluvya runs six-month vocational courses for single mothers whose children are old enough to be looked after by a family

member whilst mum is away studying I.T., Solar Electrics and Needlework. To ensure that the children are well looked after, regular health checks are being made, and a small food allowance is provided. The first two participants on this course are Avirath January and Edina Deogratia, pictured left, waiting to board the coach that will take them to Dar es Salaam and below, at the college. We are so proud of these young women.



Avirath and Edina will work with Irene and Alica at the tailoring cooperative, bringing with them their newly learned skillsets.

OUR LATEST SPONOSERED STUDENT



The latest addition to the Action in Africa family is Leath Lucas. (Pictured above). She is 6 years old and is one of the 5 new pupils we have taken on to support in Nyaishozi Primary School. Leath was just 4 years old when her father died and she is now living with her mother, who struggles to support her and her siblings. It costs just £40 a year to sponsor a primary school student.
